Possessive Pronoun A = my

Kvta hosh a kaa isht ia tuk?

Who took my car?

Katimma ho a holisso ish bohli tuk?

Where did you lay my book?

Nasalized a: Shows ownership and is used before the names of items that begin with a consonant letter.

There are two forms of possessive pronouns; the -m form and the nasalized form. The -m form is prefixed before words that begin with vowels and the nasalized form is prefixed before words that begin with consonants.

Word Meaning:

isht ia (isht i-ya) = to take **holisso** (ho-lis-so) = book **a** (anh) = yes

tuk (tuk) = past tense **kvta** (kah-ta) = who **ish** (esh) = you

katimma ho (ka-tim-ma honh) = where **kaa** (kaa) = car (no r's)

bohli (boh-li) = to lay **hosh** (hosh) = subject marker

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
