

# Lesson of The Day

**chi** = my -nasal form, prefixed before words that begin with a consonant.

**chim** = my -m form, prefixed before words that begin with a vowel.

**Chiki yvt katimma atuksvli?**

Where does your dad/father work?

**Yvmmvt chiki yo?**

Is that your dad/father?

Word Meaning:

**chiki** (ch<sup>e</sup>n-ki) = your dad/father

**yvt** (yaht) = subject marker

**katimma** (ka-tim-ma) = where

**yvmmvt** (yahm-maht) = that

**yo** (y<sup>o</sup>hn) = question marker

\***atuksvli** (ah-tohk-sa-li) = place of work

\*When an 'a' is affixed before nouns and verbs, the meaning changes to 'place where,' 'there' or 'from.' In this instance, 'tuksvli' means 'to work' but when the 'a' is placed in front of the word it becomes 'place of work' - 'atuksvli.
